Dear Chairman Sanders and Ranking Member Cassidy:

On behalf of the 1.4 million members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), I urge you to support the nomination of Julie Su as Secretary of the Department of Labor.

Since her confirmation as Deputy Secretary in 2021 and assuming the role of Acting Secretary in 2023, Acting Secretary Su has provided expert leadership for the needs of America's workers and employers. Under her leadership of the Department of Labor, our country continues to add jobs and maintain a low unemployment rate. In January 2024 alone, the U.S. economy added 353,000 jobs and our unemployment rate has stayed under 4% for two years.

Acting Secretary Su has continued the Biden administration's important work started by former Secretary Marty Walsh to increase access to registered apprenticeships, grow our health care workforce and expand youth employment. Acting Secretary Su has brought our economy through uncertain times and helped break the stalemates in negotiations of critical West Coast port workers, health care workers, auto workers and more. As Litigation Director at Asian Americans Advancing Justice - Los Angeles, the nation's largest legal and civil rights organization for Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders, she investigated, litigated and advocated to protect workers and their families. Early in her career in a landmark case, she fought for justice for workers imprisoned in a modern-day sweatshop outside Los Angeles. She also co-founded Sweatshop Watch to counter inhumane working conditions in sweatshops.

Acting Secretary Su has always fought to protect the most vulnerable workers throughout her career and has continued the fight as the Acting Secretary of Labor. She is an incredibly well-qualified, thoughtful and talented public servant who was already confirmed by the Senate in 2021. She has served admirably in the role of Acting Secretary. I urge you to vote to confirm Julie Su for the critical role of Secretary of the Department of Labor.
