AFSCME Members, Family Members Awarded 2021 Union Plus Scholarships

Winners Honored for Achievement and Union Values

Washington, D.C. – Union Plus recently awarded \$250,000 in scholarships to 199 students representing 37 unions, including 24 winners representing the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME).
